Well, as many of you are aware, the Annual General Meeting was held at Erindale College this year. From everything that I've heard, it was a huge success. The facilities were clean, modern and ideal. The attendees threw accolades our way throughout.

Services offered included raffles, door prizes, awards for the Baillie Bird-a-thon and the photo contest, guest speakers, ID quizzes and field trips, a great banquet, a huge book sale, and much more. The attendance was down marginally from previous years, but still about 100 people enjoyed the day.

Welcoming remarks from President Ron Scovell outlined the activities of the club this year. Recurring problems with the production of Ontario Birds have plagued us for years now. Recently we have hired a new printer who hopefully will get us back on track. Al Sandilands, the current editor, has advised that he will be retiring at the end of 1990. A new editor will be found, but in the interim, we still desperately need more articles for publication, as we've exhausted our present reserve. Once again you have a chance to immortalize yourself in print - so "let's get busy". Margaret Bain has graciously offered to act as assistant editor for OFO. Her duties will be to contact potential authors and coerce them to write something for the journal. So beware if Marg calls you in the middle of the night! Our new book "The History of Ornithology in Ontario" is almost ready for publication, and we hope to have it available for April or May of 1991, in time for Pelee and certainly in time for the AOU Conference next August. Additionally, we have been working on site guides to various areas of interest to birders in Ontario. To date we have commissioned articles on Hamilton, Peterborough, Pelee, Sarnia, Rainy River, Niagara and Rondeau.

A slate of field trips for 1991 was presented at the conference and for your convenience we have appended a copy to this Newsletter for your use. Some discussion ensued as to the viability of having these outings, as attendance is generally poor. However, it was decided that they are an essential service and will be continued indefinitely. They're designed for you, so why not take advantage when they're offered.

The OBRC (Ontario Bird Records Committee) announced its slate of officers for 1991. Doug McRae (Chair), Marg Bain (Secretary), Dennis Rupert, Mike Runtz, George Wallace, Nick Escott, Kevin McLaughlin and Ron Pittaway will fulfil these duties beginning in 1991.

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The Baillie Bird-a-thon was a huge success again this year with almost \$120,000 raised. OFO members raised about \$5000.00 themselves. All contributors and sponsors and organizers are to be commended for their efforts. Jeff Skevington who saw 168 species of birds and Arthur Langford who raised \$4522.50 shared the honours of the OFO Trophy this year.

For the second year Swish Maintenance sponsored a calendar slide contest for OFO members. The winner's picture will be featured on the 1991 Swish calendar (available from any Swish Maintenance outlet - Peterborough, Kingston, Ottawa, Barrie, Whitby, and Mississauga or by writing Mr. Mike Ambler, Swish Maintenance Ltd., 500 Hopkins Street, Whitby, Ont., L1N 2B9). Six entrants submitted 50 slides for review, and the team of four judges (three employees of Swish and John Carley) chose the winners as follows:

- First Prize: (\$250.00) was awarded to Mike McEvoy for his Black-and-White Warbler
- Second Prize: (\$100.00) was awarded to Geoff Carpentier for his Common Loon, and
- Third Prize: (\$50.00) was awarded to Barry Cherriere for his Short-eared Owl

The plans are to run this contest again next year so start snapping and be ready when we announce the next one. Congratulations to all entrants and to the winners. Special thanks go out to Swish and to John for sponsoring and running the contest.

And finally ... Short and Tweet ... William Mansell sent along the following item. On August 30, 1990, at Rattray Marsh, Mississauga, Ontario, a Snapping Turtle (Chelydra serpentina) was crawling through the shallow water at the edge of a mudflat. Three Lesser Yellowlegs (Totanus flavipes) were closely following it, snatching up disturbed organisms. They were expending much less energy than counterparts foraging on the adjacent mudflats.

JANUARY 12, 1991 (Saturday) : ROYAL ONTARIO MUSEUM, TORONTO.

LEADER: Ross James (416) 586-5521. Meet inside the front doors of the museum at 10:00 AM. A maximum of 25 members will be able to visit the gallery area from 10:00 AM to 11:00 AM. A maximum of 10 members will be able to see the collection areas of the museum from 11:00 AM to 12:00 noon. Call Ross to register.

FEBRUARY 3, 1991 (Sunday) : PETROGLYPHS PROVINCIAL PARK, PETERBOROUGH

LEADER: Geoff Carpentier (705) 743-8594. Meet in the parking lot at the north end of the Riverview Zoo in Peterborough at 7:30 AM. Bald and Golden Eagles, Raven, Gray Jay, Waxwings and winter finches.

MARCH 24, 1991 (Sunday): LONG POINT AREA.

LEADER: Barry Jones (519) 426-6043. Meet at the junction of Hwy 59 and Regional Rd. 42, 2 KM west of Port Rowan, at 9:00 AM. Ducks, geese, swans as well as other spring migrants.

LEADER: John Olmsted (416) 522-0409. Meet at the Conservation Area parking Lot at 9:00 AM. Take the Christie St. exit from the OEW south to the top of the escarpment. Turn right (west) at Ridge Rd., the first crossroad on the escarpment. Drive 1.5 KM to Quarry Rd., turn right to Conservation entrance .3KM. Turn right, drive through woods to viewing area. A dozen species of Raptors are possible. Beginners WELCOME!

MAY 17, 18, 19 (Sat-Mon.) POINT PELEE OFO SPRING MEETING

MAY 31, JUNE 1, 1991 (Friday, Saturday) RAINY RIVER
